# **Year In Review**

Thank you from our Board Chair and Executive Director

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Looking back on 2020 is like looking into a faded mirror. We can see the general shape of what happened, but aren't always clear on the finer details. The usual cycles of our work and personal lives disappeared, replaced by challenges and realities on a global scale that we had not faced before.

From the early reports of an unknown coronavirus – later to be called COVID-19 – Amref Health Africa supported governments and communities in sub-Saharan Africa to respond. By the time the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a pandemic on March 11, 2020, we were already hard-at-work training health workers and educating communities about this new disease. Our goal was to make sure no one was left behind – no matter who they were or where they lived.

Across our global network in Africa, Europe and North America, Amref Health Africa staff, volunteers, and supporters came together like never before, reaching 7.8 million people directly with our vital health-focused projects. Our COVID-19 response in Ethiopia, Kenya, Malawi and Senegal funded entirely by support from Canadians through the Government of Canada reached 1.4 million people. The project trained health workers, provided handwashing stations, and educated communities so they could stay safe (see page 5 for more details).

We also quickly adapted our Uzazi Uzima (Kiswahili for "Safe Deliveries") project in Tanzania to safely continue our activities in Simiyu Region to improve the health of women, teenagers and children while adding new ones to respond to the COVID-19 emergency. Pages 6 and 7 provide a snapshot of what we've accomplished in Tanzania thanks to the financial support of the Government of Canada, foundations and individuals.

Despite the many challenges brought on by COVID-19, we contributed 85% of our revenue directly to programs and programs support. We also ended 2020 on a solid financial footing, the results of our efforts over recent years to diversify and strengthen our funding base.

COVID-19 challenges remain in countries in Africa, where a severe shortage of vaccines is prolonging illness and death. Our new Vaccine Solidarity with Africa campaign is focused on raising the funds needed to ensure all communities in Africa have the same access to life-saving vaccines that we do.

We hope that you enjoy reading through our 2020 Annual Report and seeing the lasting difference your support has made. Thank you for your continued dedication to our vision of lasting health change in Africa, especially during difficult times here at home in Canada.

# **2020 Global Accomplishments**

Highlights of some of Amref Health Africa's key accomplishments from our COVID-19 response and ongoing essential health projects, made possible by our supporters from Canada and around the world.

# 



#### 7.8 million people

reached directly through 207 projects.



## 247,612 health workers

received training, including on how to prevent and treat COVID-19.



### 75,338 health workers

provided with personal protective equipment (PPE), such as masks, gowns and gloves, to prevent them from contracting or spreading COVID-19 while working.



## 3,151 people

tested for COVID-19 in Amref Health Africa clinics.



#### 101,870 people

received access to water and **806,098** received access to improved sanitation through our projects.



#### 650,498 people

received access to testing for HIV/AIDS, **133,218** for malaria and **103,354** for Tuberculosis, three of the deadliest infectious diseases in sub-Saharan Africa. Quick access to testing is vital for ensuring people get the treatment they need.



#### 303,692 vaccinations

provided to children to protect them against life-threatening, preventable diseases, such as measles, mumps and polio.

# **COVID-19 Response**

Communities in sub-Saharan Africa are facing the COVID-19 pandemic within a challenging context: fragile, under-resourced health systems that can quickly become overburdened; a shortage of trained health care workers; a lack of reliable access to clean, running water; and a limited supply of COVID-19 vaccines.

With the financial support of Canadians through the Government of Canada, and our committed donors, we responded to the COVID-19 crisis in Ethiopia, Kenya, Malawi and Senegal focusing on:

- Providing personal protective equipment (PPE), such as masks, gowns and gloves, to health workers.
- Setting up handwashing stations at health facilities, marketplaces and other public areas.
- Training community and facility-based health workers on how to prevent and control the spread of COVID-19, using our mobile health training platform called Leap.
- Busting myths and dispelling misinformation about COVID-19 through community radio programs, posters, billboards, social media and house-to-house visits.

#### **Results Highlights**



Reached 1.4+ million people directly.



Trained **25,000+** community health workers, and **1,700+** facility-based health workers, such as nurses and midwives.



Provided **4,500** N95 masks, **38,000+** disposable surgical masks, **45,000+** gloves, **1,200+** handwashing stations, **14,000+** bars or bottles of soap and **1,800** bottles of sanitizer.

#### **Community Voices**

# **Project Report** Uzazi Uzima ("Safe Deliveries")

That's a wrap on Year Four of our Uzazi Uzima (Kiswahili for "Safe Deliveries") project.

# 

Uzazi Uzima partnered with communities in the Simiyu Region in northern Tanzania to improve the health and rights of women, children and teenagers with financial support from the Government of Canada through Global Affairs Canada. Since 2017, Uzazi Uzima has focused on ensuring communities have access to sexual and reproductive health services, such as contraception, and essential health care for pregnant women, babies, growing children and teens, including immunization and nutrition. The project has also improved 24 health facilities by providing access to clean water and sanitation facilities, constructing and renovating maternity wards and operating rooms, and creating special spaces for health services tailored to youth.

When COVID-19 hit in 2020, Uzazi Uzima introduced new activities to respond, including training community and facilitybased health workers on the prevention and treatment of COVID-19 and providing much needed personal protective equipment (PPE).



## **Results Highlights**



#### 680,000+

women, girls, men and boys reached directly through the project's integrated health-focused activities.



#### 350,000

people reached directly with education about essential health care, such as contraception, immunization, nutrition and pre- and post-natal care, through community events that used plays, poetry, songs and dance to spread awareness.

#### 1.200 +

secondary school students trained on sexual and reproductive health and rights for young people. These students trained their fellow young people through youth clubs at 145 schools that were set up through the project.



#### 800

community health workers trained on sexual and reproductive health and rights. Community health workers are the first point of contact for health education in communities where the project worked.



#### 80%

of pregnant women and teenage girls delivered their babies in a health facility, an increase of 23% since the start of the project. Giving birth at a health facility, rather than at home, reduces the risk of women and newborns dying due to complications.

#### 81%



of young people, aged 10 to 24, used the youth-friendly health services established through the project. No such services existed before the Uzazi Uzima project started.

# **Impact Stories**

#### **Gertrude, Youth Peer Educator**




Peer education on SRHR [sexual and reproductive health and rights] has empowered me and my fellow young people. The education has and will offer us to participate in opportunities, to participate in activities that affect our lives and to have access to information and services we need and to protect our health,"

says Gertrude Mederd Fastori, 24, a youth educator in Bariadi District, Tanzania.

Gertrude is one of the more than 1,200 young people trained on sexual and reproductive health and rights through the Uzazi Uzima project. The training covered topics including how to prevent sexually transmitted infections, such as HIV/ AIDS, gonorrhea and syphilis, family planning, effects of pregnancy at a young age, unintended pregnancies, early marriages and unsafe abortions. Gertrude took the information she learned and educated young people in her community. She also encouraged them to seek out health care through the new youth-friendly health services created through Uzazi Uzima.

#### **Marko, Community Health Worker**



Marko Maguta, 44, is one of the 800 community health workers who was trained through the Uzazi Uzima project. He lives in Mwasamba village in the Simiyu Region of Tanzania.

I'm so grateful to Amref's Uzazi Uzima project. The training led to an increase of pregnant mothers coming to deliver at Mwasamba dispensary, from eight per month before the training to 24 per month after the training. Amref also constructed a labour ward, equipped for the mother and child. This has also resulted in an increased number of patients attending Mwasamba dispensary. Previously, many mothers did not feel comfortable giving birth at the dispensary due to a tiny delivery space and the large number of patients that populated one building.

Community health workers received training about the importance of pregnant women attending pre- and post-natal care as well as giving birth at health facilities which they then shared with community members during regular household visits.

Mwasamba dispensary also received access to water through the project. "Before Uzazi Uzima intervened in providing water, we used to tell relatives or those accompanying the pregnant mothers to carry water since the health providers can't leave the patients and fetch water," he says.

Amref Health Africa in Canada acknowledges the financial support of the Government of Canada, which is contributing \$28,502,612 over five years to improve the health of mothers and children and respond to COVID-19 in Ethiopia, Kenya, Malawi, Senegal and Tanzania, and \$11,019,769 over five years for sexual and reproductive health and COVID-19 response in rural Tanzania.

# **Vaccine Solidarity with Africa**

Amref Health Africa is part of an active movement to address the uneven distribution of COVID-19 vaccines – specifically across Africa. Current data show that less than 3% of the African population has received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine, while more than 44% of the population in North America and Europe has received at least one dose. (Our World in Data, July 2021). At this rate, the World Health Organization estimates it could take until 2023 for the continent of Africa to achieve herd immunity (60% of population vaccinated).

As global citizens, we all have a role to play. Amref Health Africa is committed to making sure no one is left behind even in the most remote communities. Together, we can have a profound impact – one that has communities at its heart.
